Andrea Baumann







Wow! If you have never thought about trying multi-axis turning, our demonstrator last month should have certainly "placed a bug under your saddle."

Before I get into the details of Mark's demo, I would like to acknowledge Rick Cannon for developing this amazing



presentation for our Guild. It took Rick quite some time to work out the details and convince the BoD of the opportunity of a great demo. That said, I would also like to point out to all who have a dedicated shop, or shop space, that hosting an out-of-town demonstrator is personally beneficial. Every host I have spoken with stressed the amount of knowledge they gained from a one-on-one conversational setting. Add to this a little personal hands-on interaction in their shop, and you get a truly price-less experience. Which brings me to thank Kay, Rick's "Better-Half, for supporting his "habit", in opening their home (and shop).

This first picture shows the members and spouses who braved the rainy weather to attend the "meet-n-greet" at Central BBQ for Mark. We had a quality evening socializing and listening to some interesting stories from Mark.



On Saturday, Mark had no trouble keeping the membership enthralled during the extended meeting. This was evident from the questions put to him.






A candlestick was the first item he presented, and although I consider it to be one of the simplest works, it is a very visually pleasing form. As Mark moved on to increasingly more complex work, the simplicity of that first technique allowed all to more easily follow the progression.

Looking back at the demo, my head still spins at the blending of artistic and technical aspects Mark has developed to

visualize his designs and, then develop the techniques to create it in 3D. Still, the following series of pictures shows Mark's care in detailing his process to bring his concepts to a physical

presence. As if this care to detail in his presentation isn't enough, Mark provides all these detailed drawings in print, or from his website.

We all enjoyed Mark's anecdotal presentation regarding the inspiration behind his famous ball bats and the "Homeland Defense Rolling Pin." Mark keeps his audience's attention with a really enjoyable and informative presentation.



Also along the way, Mark presented us with some interesting spindle turning tools and techniques. Two of interest to me were the multi-angle grind gauge and a good, safe use of a standard wood chisel.



The gauge contains more angles than any I currently have, so it gives a good read on a starting point and where I want to finish my grinding or sharpening.

Next, Mark stressed not twisting, but cutting

all turned items from the waste end, leaving a decent-sized nub. Then, taking a standard bevel chisel and using the thumb holding his work, he used it as a fulcrum to slice the nub cleanly of the work piece, in a motion arcing away from him. I have been using this process

with a spindle gouge, but I now see the value in using the sharp bevel gouge.



Since the turning gouge I just used on the spindle work piece is now dull, I run the risk of pushing it through the nub, rather than slicing it off. (I can hear my Dad now, "Joseph, let the tool do the work!")

I dare say, most of us added Mark's website to our bookmark list. If you didn't, I urge you to visit it the next time you need inspiration, or have a spell of "turners' block".
