Sign up time is over for the Bartlett BBQ Cook-off and this Friday we will be starting our Pens For Troops drive and demonstration at the event. Last year we ran two lathes and produced about 75 pens. This year we have twice the booth space, we have added a lathe, for a total of three and I would love to see us produce over 100 pens. The event will overlap our Saturday demonstration, so Sam Dawson will be manning the booth until we finish up at the Municipal Center. Anyone wanting to join Sam on Saturday morning, please let Sam, or me, know so we are aware of who is coming. We will have plenty of room for people this year and we would love to keep people rotating on the machines and working the crowd. The event will be Friday night the 27th of September from 6 - 9:30 p.m. and all day Saturday from 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Our second crafting opportunity will be The Pink Palace Craft Fair. We have the opportunity to sell our pieces, interact with the crowd, telling them all about the woodturning craft, demonstrate small items for the crowd on the lathe and have a great time with your club members. The event not only earns money for people selling, but earns money for MSWG and gives our organization a great deal of exposure to the public. I have been involved with the craft fair every year we have participated and it is always one the highlights of my year. I would love to see everyone sign up to come out and join us at Audubon Park in October. The Pink Palace Craft Fair will run from Friday, Saturday and Sunday, October 11th - 13th from 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. (Sunday the event ends at 5 p.m. but tear down takes about an hour.)

They will each give a demo of potential revenue-generating projects! That means, anyone who needs more items to sell, might want to consider one of these projects.



Also, should you need dry, or nearly dry, wood to aid completion of additional sale items, I recently stopped by Scott's Nursery, Hwy 70, Lakeland, TN (901-299-7979) to view his air-drying, rough-cut wood inventory. He has aligned himself with at least one area tree service for log supply and with his Wood-Mizer, he is milling board lengths for sale. The inventory starts with 6/4 rough-cut boards of various widths and lengths, up to about 8/4's, as the logs provide. Additionally, he said he

can offer to make custom-cut thicknesses, platter and and bowl-blanks from logs we find interesting.
