However, members should understand that the jurors are responsible for making sure that the collection is the best possible combination of work to represent the mission of showing variety, including functional traditional turnings as well as turnings that stretch the bounds of tradition toward artistic expression. #### MSWG MEETING MINUTES Saturday June 28, 2008

We need a volunteer to host Dave Hout. July 26, 2008: TBD. August 23-24, 2008: David Hout. To date (1 July 2008) we have sixteen (16) signed up for the demonstration. Nancy Boatwright and Bill Shaw have won free tickets for the event.

Larry talked about the Instant Gallery and all the items being good enough for the CBU project. The judging for the CBU event will be July 3, 2008 at Larry's house. The judges will be Swann Parks (club member), Peter Sohngen (a member of the faculty at the Memphis College of Arts) and Dennis Paullus, a club member.

Dennis updated the members on the club's participation in the Mid-South Perspective. Delta Fair will be 9 days; over 2 weekends (Aug 29-Sept 7) Board recommends demonstrating the 1st weekend. Bartlett Festival will be Friday evening, September 26 from 6 to 10 P.M. and on Saturday, September 27 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. We will participate <u>after</u> our club meeting.

Jim Adkins presented an excellent demonstration on Basket Weave Illusion Technique. The demo was well received and lots of bowls and platters using this technique will be forthcoming from the members. Larry presented Jim with a certificate of appreciation and a check to defray some of his expenses for the trip to Bartlett from Dexter, Mo.




#### Tips & Helpful Ideas

*Michael Mocho* by far is the consummate demonstrator. In a texturing demo



Michael showed some of his homemade sanding devices for doing contours on his work pieces. The sanding bar between centers on the left was a simple turned stock and glued up with sandpaper. Make it long enough and you can glue on multiple grits. On the right, Michael turned a decorative spindle that fits in the banjo. Fit a pencil in the holder, tighten down with the set

screw on the top and you have center line marker that can be used on any shape. The best of all was the belt sander he made to fit on a lathe. The photo on the far left shows the spindle that fits in the banjo. Another spindle is put between centers, then the desired belt is slid




piece in his hand in the far left picture can be made any shape to accommodate the contour his trying to achieve. This was very ingenious.

Member *Ken Reeder* was interested in what the volume should be for a burial urn so he contacted the California Cremation Center and got this response:

"There definitely is no legislated standard in California, but the standard throughout the industry is 200 cubic inches for an adult urn, with infant and keepsake urns around 20-30 cubic inches. The industry is discussing that in the future, with society growing in weight, we may have to increase that standard to maybe 225 or 250 cubic inches. The thing is, you don't want to make it too small, to not fit all of the cremated remains, but yet, you don't want to make it too large that it looks funny. Hope that helped you." Gerard Reinert


