While Bob acknowledges that he is not "an expert" on vacuum chucks, he points out that since he just put one together, the information is fresh on his mind. He will be sharing his experience with the MSWG at the November 18th meeting. Bob will discuss buying top quality components for the best price using eBay. His demo will include making a cylinder and an easy method for centering a bowl for finish turning the bottom.

Both Bob and Sandi feel strongly that the bottom of any turned piece

should be finished with as much attention to detail as the more visible components. The vacuum chuck is "just easier" according to Bob. "It's the way to do it."

MSWG GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

OctoberFest - October 28, 2006

The meeting was brought to order by President Cassandra Speier at approximately 9:15 am. Cassandra welcomed the 40 members and six visitors in attendance.

Agenda Topics: Cassandra asked for an approval of the prior general meeting minutes that had been posted in the newsletter. A motion to approve was asked for and seconded with an approval.

<u>Finance</u>: Bob Speier provided the members with a brief insight to the financials for the preceding month. He explained that the club was in pretty good shape considering the amount of money spent over the year. He also pointed out that membership renewals were coming up in November. Bob explained that a change in fees has been decided upon by the Board. The general membership fee is not going to change, however a Family (\$35), Youth (\$15), Supporter (\$100), Benefactor (\$250) and Patron (\$500) has been added.

<u>New Business:</u> President Speier thanked Joel Benson for offering his place for the OctoberFest once again.

President Speier challenged the members to turn a platter for the November meeting. She also thanked and complimented those that participated in the Gallery.

President Speier explained to the group that three members, Matt Garner, Larry Sefton and Robert Hobbs, had been nominated for the election that would be held at the November meeting. At the end of the day Ray Tanner threw his hat into the ring, changing the nominations to four.

President Speier commented on the Christmas party in December explaining that in order to participate in the gift exchange one had to bring a wrapped turned item.

President Speier pointed out to the club that January demonstrator, Travis Stinson, had won First Place in the AAW for making something lidded with a finial. She also congratulated Keith Burns for his Second Place finish. Cassandra encouraged members to participate in the upcoming contests.

President Speier encouraged members to utilize the new on-line membership renewal page on the AAW website. She pointed out that for doing so one would be eligible for the new lathe AAW was giving away.

Cassandra discussed the demo schedule for 2007 and told the members that the Board had talked to Bihn Pho regarding a demo in August. She explained that his price was \$600 a day plus expenses. She explained to the members that their support for the demo would be necessary to make it feasible. She also pointed out that the Board would market the demo to other nearby clubs. There was overwhelming support for a Bihn Pho demo.

After a great day of demonstrations and good food, OctoberFest was adjourned at approximately 2:45 pm.
