<u>Chuck Ludwigsen ~</u> Ornaments:

Thanks much to Chuck who filled in for Norm Fowler on short notice. The demonstration was well-prepared, organized, and presented in a step-by-step process. Here are some of the highlights.

Shop Safety

We all may get somewhat complacent about shop safety, but as Norm Abram (the New Yankee Workshop) says, "shop safety is first and foremost". I, for one, was glad Chuck began on this note. Chuck's keys issues:

- Wristwatches
- Jewelry, including rings
- Long sleeves
- Unnecessary clutter
- Eye protection

Chuck came with several turning blanks pre-cut to his specifications. His advice: If you plan to make more than one ornament it is useful and saves time to pre-determine 'standard' dimensions. Then prepare multiple blanks for the three parts needed: (1) globe; (2) icicle; and (3) finial.

You can typically get the icicle and finial from 1 piece of wood. Planning and routine will assist in producing consistent, high quality outcomes. Chuck uses blanks sized 2.5" x 4" for the globe and about 1" x 8" for the icicle and finial.

Step-by-Step Process

Chuck is working on a step-bystep tutorial to post on the website in the near future. The key steps to making an ornament are:

The Globe

- Turn the wood for the globe into a cylinder. Mark your overall height and midpoint of the globe.
- Shape the lower half of your globe. Shape a portion of the upper half but leave plenty of support for hollowing.
- 3. Drill a hole in the bottom of the globe for hollowing. Chuck drills a ¾" hole for this step.
- Drill a smaller hole the rest of the way through the ornament.
 This will become the hole that the top finial fits into.
- 5. Turn, sand, and finish the remainder of the globe. Leave enough wood at the top to support the sanding.
- 6. Finally, part the globe by turning away the remainder of the wood at the top.

The Icicle

- 1. Use a set of number 1 spigot jaws to hold the wood and bring up the tailstock to support the end. Turn a cylinder.
- Mark the total dimension of your icicle as well as the point where the icicle ends and you want the skirt section to begin.
- 3. Starting at the tailstock end, shape the icicle as desired. Leave about ¼" waste at the tailstock.
- 4. Turn in small sections (1-2") and sand as you go.
- 5. Form the skirt. The largest diameter of the skirt should be about 1/4" larger than the hole in the bottom of the globe.
- 6. Turn a ½" tenon above the skirt the same diameter as the hole in the globe.
- 7. Carefully turn away the remaining tailstock waste and final sand.
- 8. Undercut the skirt so that the outer edge of the skirt mates flush with the globe.
- 9. Part the icicle from the lathe at the $\frac{1}{8}$ " tall tenon.

The Finial

- 1. Mark the height of your finial plus a $\frac{1}{8}$ " tenon.
- Shape the top of the finial at the tailstock end and leave enough diameter to drill for the eyelet.
- Shape the skirt of the finial to the same max diameter of the icicle's skirt.
- 4. Form a 1/8" tall tenon the same diameter as the top (smaller) hole in the globe.
- 5. Undercut the skirt so that the outer edge mates flush.
- Using a Jacob's chuck or pin vise, drill a hole in the top of the finial with a drill bit that matches the size of your eyelet.
- 7. Part the finial at the 1/8" tenon.

A key element again relates to planning and standards. Before you begin hollowing the globe, determine the size for the openings in the top and bottom of the globe. This sets the tenon size on the icicle and the finial. Standardizing these will greatly minimize wasted efforts in fitting the three pieces together.

Specialized Tools

Chuck used all the usual tools, but did expound on his favorite for hollowing the globe. He uses the ¾" wide by ¼" thick **formed scrapers** from Hamlet Tool. These tools function like very stable swan neck hollowing tools. Chuck uses an air compressor for removal of wood shavings collected inside the globe during the hollowing process, but for the demonstration used a "low tech" method. He simply "huffed and puffed and blew it all out"!

Finishing

The finishing process for any turned project can make the difference between the ordinary and the extraordinary. Chuck reinforced these critical steps:

- Good lighting is critical and the brighter the better. Use multiple light sources and in more than one location.
- 2. Sanding may be a tedious task but cannot be ignored. You can make it easier. Sandpaper is a tool, and only works effectively when sharp. Throw it away when it gets dull. It is cheap. The reason for subsequent sanding with finer grits is to remove the scratches from the previous grit. Always progress sequentially through the grits to at least 400. Remove the sanding dust from the previous grit before moving to the next finer grit - dust can act as an abrasive too. Chuck advises sanding with the lathe at a low speed, thereby keeping the sanding medium cool. Sanding at high RPMs will generate heat, which can lead to checking, burning and casehardening rather than cutting.
- 3. Depending on the wood, Chuck may use a sanding sealer or a thin coat of CA glue to both stabilize and seal the wood. He then follows up with an application of Deft semi-gloss lacquer. For safety reasons, he prefers to use paper towels, if possible, to apply all finishing products.

Thanks, Chuck for a great demonstration. Let's all go turn a tree-full of "heirloom" ornaments!




