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Something We Should Think About

Consider the Earth An Editorial by Joan Kelly

As turners, many of us enjoy receiving "free" wood. We find it on the curb or friends inform us of trees that are being taken down due to overgrowth or disease. Some turners even take a vow to turn only salvage rather than cut trees for the purpose of creating our craft. This is one step toward a world view that includes conscientious choices to be good stewards of the earth. Another choice recently adopted by the MSWG is to offer a recycling bin for the bottles and cans we empty during our meetings. It takes no extra effort to simply deposit these containers into the bin rather than the garbage. How easy can it get?

Recently I received a powerful document containing photos and facts about the environmental impact of plastic grocery/shopping bags. The data is overwhelming: these things are BAD. Produced from petroleum products, plastic bags further deplete the world's oil supply. About 1% are recycled, but recycling bags costs much

more than producing them from scratch. The bags do degrade, but they photo degrade, breaking into smaller, more toxic petro-polymers which can then contaminate soil and water. Huge quantities of bags are dumped into our oceans where they kill all sorts of species of ocean life. The bags wash ashore where they wreak havoc on bird and animal life. Plastic bags have been found on shores in the Arctic Circle and in the Falkland Islands.

What can we do about these grim statistics? Here's another nobrainer: make a New Year's resolution to use cloth bags. Sure, you have to think ahead and take some bags with you when you go out. Many countries have banned plastic bags or levied taxes on their use. China banned bags and is saving 37 million barrels of oil per year as a result. Ireland taxes bags and as a consequence consumption has decreased by 90%. What about us?

Local woodturner wins online competition

Woodturning was not something Keith Burns had much interest in when he began working with wood in the mid-1990s. Now, the skill has made him a prize winner.

Burns, 60, came to Collierville in 1986 from Memphis' Whitehaven area. Originally he built furniture as a hobby, he said, and never did much woodturning with a cheap lathe he had pur-

chased to hold the wood in place and turn it for a cutting tool.

His reason for giving woodturning another shot around five years ago is pretty simple: "I ran out of furniture to build," he said. "I've always had an artistic outlet of some type. Woodturning is addictive once you get into it. It's hard to give it up."

Burns said he decided to join the Mid-South Woodturners Guild, which meets once a month in Bartlett. He also began searching online forums to pick up tips from other people while teaching himself how to turn.

On his fourth lathe in six years, Burns said he has work in many private collections across the country and even had a man from Hong Kong buy one of his pieces.

"That was pretty exciting," he said.

A year-and-a-half ago, the guild contributed approximately 50 pieces of work for an art show at Christian Brothers University in Memphis, with the group later donating eight pieces of work to the university – one of which belonged to Burns – for a permanent exhibit.

Earlier in the year, Burns was emailed about the Art in the Round Contest, sponsored by beautifulbowls.com. The organization was seeking original vessel-form entries such as bowls, urns, cups and mugs. At first, he was hesitant to enter.

"I didn't know what it was really about," he said.

Deciding to give it a try, Burns submitted three pieces to be juried online by visitors to artintheroundcontest.com. On Nov. 18, Burns said he found out he won the \$500 prize for first place in the turned-wood category for his hollow-form piece made from Macassar ebony wood from Indonesia.

With the first-place finish, he also qualifies for the "Best in Show" prize of \$3,000, which will be given out Sunday.


"I thought, 'you've got to be kidding," Burns said of his reaction when he learned he won.

The win, however, isn't turning Burns' hobby into a money-making venture. The artisan said he never makes a piece with the intent to sell it. If he did that, he said, it would become a job and would not be fun anymore.

"Truly, I don't do it for the money," he said. "If I had to do it for a living, I would be in deep trouble."


He admitted, however, that selling a piece of his work does bring him a special satisfaction. "When you sell a piece, it's a rush," he said.




Tips & Helpful Ideas



Getting to know the "Pro's"

Larry & I had the pleasure of meeting and dining with Bill at the First Annual Segmented Symposium in Indianapolis. This man is a consummate open segmented turner and works in a scale you wouldn't believe. Meet Bill Smith.

Bill Smith

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I have been involved in segmented woodturning since 1993 and open segmented turning since 1996. I am primarily self-taught having acquired an interest in turning as a hobby. I developed the system I am demonstrating after seeing a turning made by Yosh Sugiyama, the originator of the open segment concept. I first demonstrated my system at the 1999 Tacoma symposium. Since that time many turners, both beginners and experts, have successfully created open segmented turnings using my system. In 2002 I authored the book Segmented Woodturning published by Schiffer Publishing Ltd. To make the system available to turners who missed my Tacoma demonstration.

I reside in a rural area of SE Pennsylvania with Lynn, my wife of 35 years. I am a member of Lehigh Valley Woodturners and a board member of Bucks Woodturners and I am on the steering committee for the Echo Lake Collaborative Conferences. I retired early in 2004 to spend more time on woodturning and my other hobbies of hiking, photography and astronomy.
