Jason Clark will be sharing an all-day demo with us on Saturday 22nd of February and the following day, Sunday, we will have a Hands-On class at Larry Cutliff's home in Mason, TN. There will be a sign-up sheet at the February meeting for the Hands-On class. We have two openings available for the Sunday class and the cost is \$125.00.

March will bring our first President's Challenge of the year and, thanks to all of the ideas that Jonas Nemanis' demo planted into our heads, the challenge will be a vessel hollowed from the bottom and resealed with a plug. We will have 3 categories, Beginners, Wood Finish Surface and Embellished Surface. I encourage

everyone to participate in at least one, if not all, of our President's Challenges because it provides our club with excellent items to auction off at our club party in December. Dennis Paullus was challenged years ago to come up with a way for club members to not have to pay an extra fee to bring in quality demonstrators and the auction was born from that need. This activity benefits everyone in MSWG and I hope you will consider turning a piece for the challenge and supporting your club.

Another great event that we have undertaken for the past 5 years has been The Pink Palace Craft Fair. This event provides all our members the opportunity to sell their pieces at a wellattended craft setting. We usually have at least 10-14 members participate, and this has become one of my favorite events of the year. We are set up in the Demonstrator's, blue and white striped tent at Audubon Park and we are contracted to provide demonstrations for the public during the three-day event. For the past two years, we have upped our game and we have added a second lathe which we set up outside of the tent and we turn spinning tops and ornaments for the kids and parents. This has become a highlight for the young ones, and they flock to see the tops turned. This is a great opportunity to demonstrate for the public and improve your demonstrating skills and confidence. This event also earns monies for the club as The Mid South Woodturners Guild receives 25% of all sales. With the club's 25% we pay the booth fee and the remainder goes to the club's general fund.

We have also, for the past two years, held a demonstration event geared around Pens For Troops, where we set up lathes and demonstrate turning charity pens that will be sent overseas to our troops. I just received a wonderful letter from a gentleman in our Navy who had just received one of our pens and responded to the note we had placed inside. It was great to see our efforts come full circle and that we are making a difference. I have heard some people say, "I'm not a pen turner" and I really don't care. These are not hard items to turn and if you only turn one piece you could make a great difference. Our venue that we have attended for the past two years will not work for us this year, so we are actively looking for another opportunity to hold this event. We are open to suggestions. We just received a shipment of 150 slim line pen kits and our wonderful pen master, Sam Dawson, will take these and glue up the wood and barrels so they are a complete kit. We will be making some of these kits available at our club meetings so we can get a head start on production.

We turned in 165 pens last year and I am sure we can do many more than that.

Please consider bringing items for the raffle that occurs at the end of each meeting. You can offer wood, tools, shop items and equipment. Anything you think will bring a profit for the club.

We only ask that you don't bring wood that you would not use yourself, (such as cracked) and broken tools unless they contain usable parts, which can be salvaged. We use those funds to provide the refreshments for each club meeting.








November: Multi-Axis Turning Class w/ Mark Sfirri
