** Hollow Forms on a Mini-Lathe - Travis Stinson **

Do you turn on a mini lathe and sometimes think it limiting? Do you find hollow forms intriguing yet intimidating? Would you like to meet the turner who won first place in the fall AAW contest for turning a lidded box with a finial? Meet Travis Stinson! Travis will be the featured demonstrator at our regular meeting on January 27.

Travis hails from Brookhaven, Mississippi, and is a member of the Magnolia Woodturners. He has enjoyed woodworking for a number of years. He bought a small lathe for the specific purpose of turning some spindles for a plant stand he was making for his wife. That was in 2003. He quickly became an avid and highly skilled turner. His machines of choice now are a Powermatic 3520A and a Jet Variable Speed Mini Lathe. To see some of his exquisite work, go to

Travis has developed a hollowing rig to fit the Jet Mini. Think of the Jamieson system, only smaller. This will be the focus of the demo he will present to our club. Travis will turn a hollow form, start to finish, using his self-designed system. He will explain how he created the rig and answer questions about its construction. This will undoubtedly be an enlightening demonstration that will offer useful information for new and seasoned turners alike.

Travis has graciously agreed to serve as the non-MSWG member of the committee that will prepare the guild show at Christian Brothers University in August 2007. His expertise is appreciated for that occasion and for the January demonstration.





Shop Talk

Steve Van Voorst

I visited Steve's shop today and was very impressed at the quality of his turning with just a couple of years experience. "I have always known that I wanted to work with wood" says Steve "but with my medical career, woodworking had to be put on hold." It was last year that Steve retired as a General Surgeon from the VA Medical Center in Memphis, ending a thirty three year career in the operating room in Colorado, Florida and Tennessee. When Steve first came to Memphis twenty four years ago, he was one of the first surgeons involved in the Liver Transplant Program. He is currently an Associate Professor of Surgery at the University of Tennessee and continues to teach the art of surgery to medical students.

Steve has been turning wood for the past two years, after he and his wife, Debra, visited the Arts and Crafts pavilion at the Mid-South

Fair and was inspired by the woodturning demonstrations of our past President, Hershel Miller, and our past Treasurer, John Stubblefield. (Both excellent turners.) He accepted an invitation to attend the October Turning Festival and spent the entire day watching Chuck Ludwigsen's pen turning demonstration. He then shortly began purchasing woodturning equipment in anticipation of his retirement from surgery. His first and only lathe has been a Jet Variable Speed Mini but he is "eyeing" a Powermatic and his wife states if probably won't be long before one appears in the shop!

Steve joined the Mid-South Woodturners Guild in 2005. This is his first opportunity to be a part of a non-medical organization. From all appearances he is having fun in his new "career". Someone found out that one of his hobbies is computer programming and he says


