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

I had the great pleasure to spend a few minutes with Emmett in his shop last month. Emmett, like so many of us, has turned his two car garage into a nice shop. He started in 1985, "I sold my 1985 Mercedes convertible and used the space and the proceeds to set up my shop. Starting from scratch, my itemized spreadsheet reveals that approximately \$6,000 was required. This is a lot cheaper than a bass boat and I don't have to purchase gasoline." He really does have the spreadsheet on what he's spent if anyone's

interested in seeing it.

Emmett "started woodturning three years ago, in the summer of 2005, when he joined the Midsouth Guild. Bought a OneWay 1224 lathe in November of 2005. I am going to John C. Campbell Folk School for my 4th visit this December. Hershel Miller has helped me a great deal. I also watch video tapes, read a lot of woodturning books, and monitor woodturner chat rooms, especially WoodCentral."

Emmett "like's to experiment with different woods and techniques. My interest is mainly traditional woodturning -- making useful items. I have almost no interest in making items where most of the time is spent working off the lathe -- the wood is my emphasis. My embellishments are limited, mainly simple inlays and writing on wood.."



Emmett has property south of Somerville that he travel's to at least once a week. He says the property supplies him with all the green woods he can turn. All AAW members know what they like best about their membership but some chapter members may not yet be


AAW members and may wonder what benefits await them when they do join the AAW. If someone does not join AAW, the result may be they do not get as involved, may

Ray Tanner said in an email to our President "I would like to send Dave a simple thanks as I thought his presentation the best we've ever had. He knew his material, demonstrated and explained it well and answered all questions."

"Secondly, at one point he demonstrated use of a #2 morse taper with a male threaded end (to be inserted into the tailstock) which would hold the chuck removed from the headstock with the bowl still in place. It is used to precisely center an almost finished bowl (which has no center mark on its bottom) so that it may be chucked again on the headstock and the original bottom tenon turned off and the bowl completed. My question is: was this only for use with a vacuum chuck or will it also work when the 3" ID piece of pvc pipe with protective foam is used over a headstock chuck?"
