I guess maybe that was a little dramatic. but if the Skew isn't the first tool you learned to conquer — it can be much more difficult to get the hang of than some of the others.



Bill discussed some safety issues, tool bar set-up and how to place the tool to the wood.

He spent a great deal of time explaining

Skew!" Bill dealt with the most uncooperative tool in our inventory and made it seem like a tool that could be productive! In addition, I must admit that this tool has caused me to produce some items that I had no intentions of producing! However, Bill was very persistent and convinced those present "that the Skew could be tamed?" His demonstration was certainly impressive! Our hats are off to you Bill – Many Thanks!!

The Year 2005 – Safety note – When using CA Glue – Make sure you have adequate ventilation. Fumes from CA Glue are harmful to your eyes, lungs, and destroy brain cells (and most of us don't have any excess).

Personal Goals for 2005 – Select a tool and master the use of that tool, learn how to sharpen it, use it until you can produce a cut that requires little sanding. Learn to establish the bevel and rub the bevel the entire cut. Its only wood – learn how to work with it – learn how your tools work with it – learn how a really sharp tool working on the bevel feels and sounds when cutting a thin ribbon. Become one with the tool – make it an extension of yourself – when you pick it up it feels right – it feels comfortable in your hands.

Instant gallery – March's gallery had an excellent variety – keep bringing your work! The items displayed should make it to the Mid South Fair Creative Arts Exhibit in September! Please make plans to enter at least one item in this years fair!!

Raffle – This is an excellent time of the year to work with green wood! It will keep longer and the lower temperatures allow it to dry at a slower rate resulting in less checking. So pick up that freshly cut wood and share some with club members through the raffle.

Programs – We have contacted two professional turners for the spring and summer time frame – if all goes well, we might be able to have two spring and/or summer weekend symposiums. As of this writing, we do not have a response for our quarries.

From AAW – Begin making plans to attend the 2005 AAW Symposium in Kansas City. Symposium dates are July 22 – 24 – check the AAW web site for additional information as well as the American Woodturners magazine.

Topic for April 23rd meeting: -- Bowl with a Lid: – Featuring Mike Kelly

If you have never tried to turn a bowl with a lid then this is you opportunity to see how the process is accomplished. Mike will turn the bowl then a matching lid (or lid from the same species of wood). This application can be carried on to lidded boxes, kitchen canisters, and most any object requiring a cover.

SHOP TALK

I ventured to Jackson. Tennessee this month to check out Cecil Cravens' shop. His shop is totally unique and not what I expected. It's a

1925 two story Railroad Hotel. He purchased it in 1996. The hotel included a kitchen, diner, five rooms and a bathroom. He uses every inch of the space and has the equipment to expand even more. He has commercial grade equipment that would make any wood worker envious.

Cecil started turning in Junior High school. He was unable to continue because he did not have the equipment at home.

In 1996, Cecil was inspired to take up turning again when he looked at one of his wife's candy dishes and said, "I could turn that if I had a lathe." So, a friend lent him a 30 year old Shop Smith that he used until he was able get his own lathe. That same year, he joined Midsouth Wood Turners Guild and attended the meetings at Colco.

In 1998, he had an idea to start a Wood Working shop where anyone could enjoy creating their works of art using wood. That dream came true in 1999. The City of Jackson agreed to hire Cecil as an employee and use a building that Cecil owned as a Wood Working Shop. Everyone could use the equipment for a small fee. Porter Cable and Delta agreed to outfit the shop with most of the tools needed to get it running. He planned and taught twenty classes, one per week, every Saturday. This kept him so busy that he was forced to give up the Turner's guild.

In 2004, he had to close the shop since it was loosing too much money. He now works out of his old hotel again and is able to attend our monthly meetings.

He turns on a Delta 52-701, a Delta mini and a

Delta 1642. He enjoys turning segmented type bowls and vases.

His favorite wood is Walnut which he won't run out of any time soon. See, he came across a truck load or should I say 24, 15 passenger van loads. About 12-15,000 board

feet of Walnut, Maple and a variety of other hard woods.

The picture to the right is Cecil holding a couple of his huge vases he displays and sells at the Dickson Gallery of Fine Art in Jackson. Turns out that he has several pieces on display.



AAW Youth Program

In keeping with our mission of " fostering a wider understanding and appreciation for turning among the general public ", The American Association of Woodturners has declared this June to be " Youth Month ". It will be dedicated to the teaching of woodturning to young people. In an effort to create a new generation of woodturners, local chapters are encouraged to focus their meetings on teaching " hands on " the craft of woodturning to as many young people as possible. Getting youth interested can be a challenge! Consider involving other organizations including your local 4-H clubs, Boy and Girl Scout organizations, church groups, and local schools (art and shop classes). To effectively create a lasting enthusiasm for turning, we recommend at least 3-5 separate lessons be employed combining some review of the previous lesson as well as covering some new techniques. Simple projects such twig pots, tops, pens, or yoyo's seem to be easily completed in a session and give the youth both an appreciation for turning and the satisfaction of taking home a completed project. Remember: Safety during all sessions should be stressed.

To further encourage a growing "Youth movement, the AAW will create an instant gallery at the Overland Park Symposium especially for youth to display their work. All entries to the instant gallery will be included in a drawing for a prize to be announced at the symposium. Additionally free entrance to the symposium can be arranged for a youth 10-17 when accompanied by an attending registered adult. Contact the AAW office to register youth. We will have continuous hands on sessions, some with world-class turner Bonnie Klein. Twenty complete turning outfits, including Jet Minilathes, chucks and tools will also be given to some of out lucky attending youths.

We hope every chapter will see the importance of involving our youth and passing the knowledge and joy of turning to our next generation.
