Bill was intrigued by the turning process as a child watching a neighbor work on a lathe. His own first lathe was made by Mattel Toy Company. With the help of a beginner's turning book, he began turning on a "real" lathe about twenty-five years ago,

staying up into the wee hours sharpening his tools with hand files. In retrospect, Bill says it is a wonder he stuck with it those first few years.

Just a few of the gallery pieces at Oktoberfest




If you did not attend Oktoberfest at Joel's vou missed a great demonstrations, outstanding food, perfect weather, wonderful peo-






