Michael Mocho in Memphis

MWSG's March-06 regular meeting was "re-vamped" this month to include a two-day demonstration by one of the most accomplished professional woodturners in the country: Michael Mocho!

Michael is a self-employed artisan producing a variety of original designs including sculptural containers, commissioned furniture, architectural elements. and speculative works for exhibition. Technical services include contract woodturning, custom furniture, architectural millwork, prototype development, and product fabrication. Since 1997 he has been an instructor at the Santa Fe Community College Fine Woodworking Program. His background includes restoration and adjustment of violins, violas, cellos, basses, man-



dolins, and guitars; production of one-of-a-kind furniture, carved doors, architectural woodwork, patterns for metal casting, largescale sculpture in wood, glass, metal and stone; and antique restoration, furniture construction and repair. Clearly a multitalented artist!

The weekend began with a focus on the basics of spindle work. Michael impressed on the audience the importance of "the woodturner's sway or dance". One's body must not be static or immobile when turning and your arms should not be what really moves the tool. Body stance should be balanced, relaxed, slightly bent at the knee, and "sway" as back and forth or around the piece of work on the lathe. This decreases body rotation and changes in the tool/ bevel angle and will keep the tool moving consistently over the work producing a smooth and even cut. Michael stated the

Three Rules for tool control and smooth cuts: 1) rub the bevel; 2) rub the bevel; and 3) rub the bevel.

Michael is a master of the skew chisel and he demonstrated its proper use. He began with a rather unusual hand grip: the left index finger

is placed under the tool rest and around the post, and the left thumb rests on top of the tool rest to support and balance the tool. This grip will help to avoid those nasty catches we all love. Michael reminded us that "a catch = an unsupported edge." This grip is also appropriate for gouges, too.

Michael demonstrated various methods for texturing wood: 1) Chatter work using the skew and spindle gouge. Chatter occurs when the tool begins to "bounce" on the wood. With the wood spinning at a relatively slow RPM and moving the tool rest away from the wood, the skew is presented at the 7:30 position and drawn across the spinning wood. Slower RPMs will create patterns with more detail. Commercial chatter tools are available. but Michael demonstrated that almost any tool can produce chatter—intentionally or, as I am ac-

customed, unintentionally. 2) Embossing using leather punches and producing very intricate patterns. 3) Spiraling tool to produce beautiful varied spiral designs. This tool is temperamental and challenging to use, but with practice and perseverance will add unique patterns to your work. As in chatter work, angle of the tool determines the intricacy of the pattern. The tool is used at a slow RPM to produce a clean pattern and to keep the teeth of the cutting gear from skipping.

spindle gouge and his favorite woods to turn are Pecan and Walnut.

He is learning to use the skew more since he can already use the majority of his tools fairly well. As with most turners, the skew requires some time to tame.

After taking a beginner's class by Dick Absher, he became more interested and proficient in 'wasting' wood. He joined the MSWG and the AAW and has been a member since 1998.
